



Save the Prairie Society (STPS) is an all-volunteer not-for-profit 50l(c)(3) organization incorporated in 1975. STPS works in partnership with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, the Forest Preserve District of Cook County and the Illinois Nature Preserves Commission to preserve and restore Wolf Road Prairie.

The Society's mission is:

- Acquire natural areas and wildlife habitat
- Preserve, protect and enhance biodiversity
- Restore native ecosystems
- Offer field trips, prairie tours and natural historic and cultural programs and events at Wolf Road Prairie and the Prairie House
- Promote a connection to nature through the arts and
- Work to restore the historic Prairie House as a Nature Center and Museum.

Natural Areas Rescue Fund (NARF) was initiated in 1993 by STPS as a land acquisition project to save imperiled "orphan" natural areas and threatened and endangered species in Illinois.

STPS is a member of Chicago Wilderness, Earth Share of Illinois and The Land Trust Alliance. We support local, statewide and national conservation and environmental causes. STPS docents lead tours at Wolf Road Prairie and the Prairie House for student and adult groups by reservation. We offer monthly educational programs and events at Wolf Road Prairie and the Prairie House as a community service, and work to promote the site as a tourism destination that highlights conservation and history.

Frohes Newjahr!

Franzosenbusch Heritage Project

Happy New Year to all!

Fröhliche Weihnachten! and Frohes Neujahr! I'm sure that these sounds would have been heard around this time of year in our Prairie school house in the 1850's, as German was the language spoken there. So much of the lives of the settlers is so hard to imagine today, but one can get a sense of the cold winters, the snow blowing and drifting around the intersection of Cermak and Wolf Road, and the wind whipping around the little wooden school house. Before this school was built the little children would have to walk to Addison for church services, special instructions, and holiday events. Especially in the winter, it took them a very long time to make it there. They were happy to get a ride on a cart from someone, and upon arrival at their destination on Church Road their lunches had to be thawed out next to a warm fireplace. This is actually one of the few documented events that we have been able to glean from historic source material. The research committee is continually looking for historic sources and documentation to help us understand and interpret the lives of the people living in our prairie community. This group is always engaged in research of the factors which impacted the mid 19th century Franzosenbusch community.

2010 has been a busy year for the research committee. We have started a new fund-raising project with the *Friends of the Prairie House* in September. We thank all the new members for their generous contributions to the cause of saving our history and creating a museum to serve as a gateway to the beautiful prairie - a meeting place for education and the enjoyment of nature. We will continue to send out newsletters and host great programs for members and anyone interested in special topics for genealogy, local history, historic crafts, and the natural environment. Early this year the research committee set up a little history office at #9 Hickory Lane to house supplies, files, and information we have gathered over the years. This will continue to be an ongoing project to support our various research endeavors, especially with respect to genealogy and education.

Our Harvest Fest gave us the opportunity to get into costume again and feature our school house with tours, history lessons for the public and beautiful music. The research team decorated the school house and teacherage with antique books, bedding, and clothing, and even showed off some of our special museum pieces. The fest also featured a native American teepee, many vendors, artists, a children's painting area, great food, and we even added an information booth this year equipped with a basket raffle.

In the summer we started a Sunday work event for volunteers. Initially they worked on the front garden and the parking lot with the help of scout troops, and a very generous donation started a very nice German herb garden. We cleaned the brick pathways around the house and re-sanded them. The Prairie house and school museum has been cleaned several times as well. Our volunteers cut many hours of buckthorn around the periphery of the property. This is a great opportunity to thank all those who contributed hours and hours of work every Sunday. We plan to continue the work hours through the winter. Come join us!


